

# Nursing Home Deficiencies Explained

All nursing homes in the U.S. that are certified for either Medicare, Medicaid, or both are surveyed approximately once a year by surveyors from the State Survey Agency. When a surveyor finds a situation that is in violation of federal or state regulations, the surveyor issues a *Citation of Deficiency*. The nursing home must then develop a *Plan of Correction* to fix the problem. The Plan of Correction must be approved by the State Survey Agency.

Between surveys, complaints filed with the Survey Agency are investigated by Complaint Investigators. If the complaint is found to be valid, a Citation of Deficiency is issued. These deficiencies are included in the total deficiency counts for that Survey Cycle.

Deficiencies carry a letter "grade" indicating the severity of the infraction. These letter "grades" are explained in the graph below. The graph also explains the time frames for the Survey Cycles and the descriptions of the star ratings.

<p>The deficiencies in this report have been issued during the last three Survey Cycles. An annual survey is conducted in each nursing home. 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There are two kinds of deficiencies, health deficiencies and fire deficiencies. The health deficiencies are issued for anything prohibited by federal or state regulations in the operation of the home. Fire deficiencies deal with the structure of the nursing home itself in relation to accepted fire prevention measures.

The wording of any deficiency comes directly from a list of deficiency descriptions. Those descriptions each carry a code consisting of a letter and two or three numbers. For health deficiencies, that letter is an F and are referred to generally as F-tags. For fire deficiencies, the letter is a K. The associated numbers indicate which of the many deficiency descriptions applies.

For instance, one health deficiency is

*F-333 Ensure that residents are safe from serious medication errors.*
